Dear Chairman Gensler:

We write to urge the Securities and Exchange Commission (SEC) to consider rulemaking to help combat workplace harassment by requiring publicly-traded companies to disclose on annual financial filings the number and aggregate amounts of settlements, judgements, and awards with respect to workplace harassment, including sexual harassment and assault. Public reporting on such business expenses will help shareholders and consumers make relevant investment decisions and will incentivize corporations to foster safer and more respectful workplaces.

According to the Equal Employment Opportunity Commission (EEOC), one in three women has experienced harassment in the workplace. Workplace harassment and assault force many people, especially women, to leave their job, or industry completely, due to an unsafe work environment. These situations negatively impact the health and safety of workers, and consumers, as well as the value of corporations.

In recent years, the EEOC has recovered nearly \$300 million for survivors of workplace harassment through either resolved charges or litigation. This figure is likely dwarfed by millions of dollars that companies are spending litigating or secretly settling workplace harassment and assault claims.

The SEC's stated mission is, in part, to make sure that the public and shareholders have the timely, accurate, and complete information they need to make confident and informed decisions about when or where to invest. By informing shareholders and the public about expenses related to harassment and assault disputes, the SEC will be able to improve accountability for these companies and incentivize them to prevent workplace harassment and assault.

The good news is that the SEC has existing authority to require publicly-traded companies to disclose on annual filings the number of settlements, judgements, and aggregate settlement amounts with respect to workplace harassment and assault. Requiring this type of reporting would build on the SEC's existing work in improving transparency of corporate practices. For example, on March 21, 2022, the SEC proposed the "Enhancement and Standardization of Climate-Related Disclosures for Investors" rule to require publicly-traded companies to provide certain climate-related information in their annual reports.

We must tackle workplace harassment and assault and the culture of secrecy that enables abuse. Under the SEC's existing authority and reporting requirements, we urge you to harness its power to improve transparency, hold corporations accountable, and incentivize safer, more respectful workplaces.
